

# CALIFORNIA FIREFIGHTERS BENEVOLENT FUND

Thousands of California firefighters work tirelessly for our communities, day in and day out. When catastrophic wildfires or disasters strike, firefighters remain on the front lines – even as their own homes are damaged or lost.

The **California Fire Foundation** established this fund in 2018 in response to losses incurred by firefighters battling the Northern California Camp Fire and the Southern California Woolsey and Hill Fires. In 2021, as a result of the generosity of our donors, we were able to expand the program to also provide a benevolent benefit in instances where a firefighter is injured or killed in the line of duty.

Thanks to increased outreach efforts, the Benevolent program was able to increase the number of firefighters served by 118% versus 2021 and provided 222% more funding compared to the previous year.

# SUPPLYING AID TO VICTIMS OF EMERGENCY (SAVE)

Launched in 2014, this program engages frontline firefighters from across California – distributing SAVE cash cards to eligible survivors of fire or other disaster. The cards provide survivors immediate, short-term assistance and are used to purchase basic necessities, including food, medicine, clothing or temporary lodging. In 2019, due to the commitment of our donors, we were able to increase the value of the SAVE cards from \$100 to \$250 each.


# **DISASTER RELIEF FUNDING**

This program was activated in 2021 to support the immediate needs of those in under-resourced communities impacted by the ongoing pandemic, as well as survivors of major fires, including the Northern California Dixie and Caldor Fires who were displaced because of evacuations and those impacted by damage or loss to their homes.

Working directly with community-based organizations on the ground, we awarded cash grants and distributed \$250 cash cards in 2022 – providing critically-needed assistance to California communities in the midst of disaster.

# FIRE PREVENTION & PREPAREDNESS GRANTS

Since 2018, with the help of our major funding partners,

California Fire Foundation has awarded over 500

projects totaling more than \$10 million in direct support to fire departments, firefighter associations and community-based organizations actively serving high fire threat and under-resourced communities in regions throughout California.

In 2022, the Foundation awarded **116** grants totaling **more than \$1.9 million** to **51** fire departments/local firefighter associations, **65** community organizations across the state.



# 20TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE CALIFORNIA FIREFIGHTERS MEMORIAL

2022 marked the 20th Anniversary of the California Firefighters Memorial, and for the first time in almost three years, the California Firefighters Memorial was held in person at the SAFE Credit Union Convention Center in Sacramento, followed by an evening recessional to the Memorial Wall in Capitol Park. We honored 82 brave individuals who died in the line of duty.

We expanded financial support for the attending families to include covering their hotel stay along with a \$500 travel stipend to cover additional expenses.

As the California Fire Foundation plans to expand the current Memorial Wall, funds will again be needed to ensure that all we lose in the line of duty will be honored in this most solemn tribute.
