COMMITTED TO HONORING OUR FALLEN, MEMORIAL EXPANSION BREAKS GROUND





The California Firefighters Memorial in Sacramento's historic Capitol Park is a unique and stunning tribute to the 1,527 firefighters who have died in the line of duty since California became a state in 1850.

Each year since 2002, the Annual California Firefighters Memorial Ceremony has honored those firefighters who have lost their lives. The solemn remembrance is steeped in the traditions of the firehouse and hundreds of firefighters, family members, and grateful citizens gather in the heart of California's capital, to honor those who have paid the ultimate price to keep

California communities safe. Yet, the sad reality is that every year, we add names to the Memorial Wall, and we are at a point in time where we've run out of room to honor and remember them.

"With the addition of 35 names last year, we have filled the original wall," announces Brian K. Rice Chair of the California Fire Foundation and President of California Professional Firefighters. "But unlike a war memorial, this Memorial will never have an end date. This is a living monument, there is never going to be a year that goes by that we do not lose a California firefighter in the line of duty."

On March 20, 2024, the California Fire Foundation's Executive Director, Chair, and Board members, along with local firefighters, families of the fallen, and California elected officials, held a ceremonial groundbreaking event to announce its campaign to raise 12-million-dollars to make the expansion of the Memorial Wall become a reality.

THIS YEAR MARKS the start of my fifth year as Executive Director of the California Fire Foundation and, during this time, California has endured some of the worst and most unprecedented natural disasters we've come to know. of a house fire in the form of \$250 gift cards. Our grants program continues to ease the burden on fire departments, firefighter associations, and community-based organizations whose vital projects focus on making Californians safe and resilient.

Along with our other programs, our standards remain high, but our most heartfelt work has been launched - the foundation's first multi-year capital campaign to expand our California Firefighters Memorial in Capitol Park. Please stay tuned throughout this year for opportunities to get involved, how to donate and show your support for this once-in-a-lifetime project to make the expansion of the Memorial Wall become a reality.

In closing, I assure you the California Fire Foundation is committed to supporting the families of California firefighters and the work we are doing reflects the mission we set out to achieve. I could not be prouder of the work the Foundation team has committed itself to and of our donors who make these possibilities reality.

"Since 1991, our President Emeritus Daniel A. Terry was committed to creating a place in Capitol Park where the families of our fallen brothers and sisters could remember and honor their loved ones for generations to come," President Rice states. With the announcement of the expansion today, that commitment made over two decades ago remains active and is now one step closer to creating the space to honor an additional 4,600 firefighters over the next 150 years.

Since its unveiling in 2002, the Memorial Wall has nearly doubled the 855 names it started with in just two decades time. The Foundations' ability to provide this essential tribute depends on the expansion of the California Firefighters Memorial, so the families of those lives lost in the line of duty will continue to have sacred ground to gather and honor their

loved ones like Rosalie Turbeville, the wife of CAL FIRE Deputy Chief, Bruce Turbeville who was a Memorial Wall honoree in July, 2022.

"The Wall is to remember Bruce and what he stood for in his career and his dedicated service doing what he loved most," says Rosalie. "I know he would be so humbled knowing that he made a difference and would be remembered forever on the Memorial Wall."

Turbeville remembers a time when she and her late husband would walk the Capitol Park grounds early into their relationship during their lunch breaks. Now, she and her family gather from across California to share his memory with each other, together, at the Memorial.

"The Wall and beautiful statues tell a story that I believe is testament to the courage of the selfless men and women who willingly sacrificed their own lives to protect us," Rosalie continues. "For generations to come, Bruce and all his brothers and sisters, will be remembered for their commitment to the fire service that they served with pride."

The Memorial Expansion cer-

emony culminated in a symbolic first turning of the dirt with the California Fire Foundation's Executive Director Rick Martinez, its Board of Directors, and by recognizing the local fire departments and other key stakeholders on scene for their continued support in this historic project.

To make this a reality, we need your help. The Memorial was built, and is maintained, entirely through private fund raising — much of it coming from firefighters themselves. We welcome donations large and small to keep this most fitting of tributes as a legacy for our brave fallen brothers and sisters for years to come.

THE CALIFORNIA FIREFIGHTER

LICENSE PLATE

For over two decades, the California Firefighter License Plate has been established as one of the most iconic images on the highways and byways of California. The California Firefighter License Plate program allows active, retired, and volunteer firefighters to show their pride while supporting our brothers and sisters who have made the ultimate sacrifice. As of January 1, 2018, surviving family members of the fallen are eligible to purchase California Firefighter license plates.

Over 48,000 California Firefighter license plates are on the roads today. The specialty plate was created by the California Professional Firefighters and features the iconic Backdraft movie poster image,



the rights of which were donated for exclusive use on the California Firefighter specialty plates. The License Plate program is administered by the California Fire Foundation with a portion of the proceeds from the sales of these specialized license plates going toward the expansion, maintenance, and upkeep of the California Firefighters Memorial.

25 YEARS AND COUNTING



hat has become known as a well-established fixture across California's fire services and its members – the Pipes and Drums of California Professional Firefighters was created 25 years ago (1999) to perform the great traditions of Scottish bagpipe bands at funerals and memorial services honoring California firefighters who have died in the line of duty.

Today, the band stands with extreme pride as it doubled in size, which began with 12 original members. The California Fire Foundation had the privilege to connect with a founding member of the Pipes and Drums, retired Captain, Eric McKellar from the Los Angeles County Fire Department, who shared his story about how the band has impacted his life. "This band is family to me and I'm very proud to be their leader, but mostly I consider myself a friend to all our members," says McKellar. "They have been with me through some tough times in my life and I plan on being there for them as long as they'll have me."

McKellar reflects on the band's first few events and funerals they were involved in and what he considers to be a pivotal moment in the band's growth moving forward, "I could see that the band gave a sense of pride and tradition to firefighters and their families," he shared. "That in turn gave us pride and a drive to get better."

With its continued success, the CPF Pipes and Drums are now one of the best and largest firefighter bands in the state allowing them to participate in

many more events, services, and memorials across California. However, one thing that may not be known is that all those who participate in the band are either active or retired firefighters, whose participation is entirely volunteer.

McKeller recalls his origin story which began in dark times in his life. It wasn't until he answered the Pipes and Drums ad to become a member that he ignited a new passion and sparked a lasting love. "I really needed something positive for myself and the band filled the bill. So, at first it was a very personal thing for me but moved into something much bigger," he confirms.

McKeller leaves us with some personal advice about the importance of the band for our future generations, "I encourage all locals to get young members involved. The traditions of the fire service must be carried on and the sound of pipes and drums at every memorial can only continue if the support from membership continues."

2023 GRANTS RECAP AND COMMUNITY IMPACT

In recent years, California has endured some of the worst and most extraordinary natural disasters we've come to know. Not only have communities witnessed some of the most unprecedented wildfire seasons over the last decade, but they also continue to deal with abnormal biospheric winter storms resulting in floods, debris flows and mudslides in burn scar areas, and infrastructure instability, forcing economic interruptions, and sadly displacing thousands of families, seniors, and others disproportionately impacted from their homes.

Just as our state's firefighters are all hazard, the California Fire Foundation remains vigilant and prepared to assist California communities when a major wildfire or other disaster strikes. As part of our mission, we dedicate ourselves to providing immediate, mid- and long-term financial support in the form of grants to CPF local unions and other firefighter associations, fire departments, and community-based organizations across the state in their efforts to protect the communities they serve. Since we last met at Convention, these have been made possible by the ongoing generosity of our major funding partners, including Pacific Gas & Electric, Edison International, General Motors, and Chevron.

Last year, thanks to the generous support of our major funding partners, the Foundation

is excited to share that we awarded over \$1.38 million in direct support to 86 wildfire and other disaster-related prevention, preparedness, relief and recovery projects statewide. In 2023 alone, because of our efforts in collaboration with our funding partners, the lives of 4.9 million Californians were directly impacted across our great state all while successfully providing much-needed help to 45 local fire departments and firefighter associations, and 41 community-based organizations. Our grants and contributions assisted our impacted communities with the relief and recovery, education, planning, outreach, training, protective equipment, and mitigation they needed.


