

Message from our Executive Director AS 2022 ENDED, Californians were given a stark reminder of the power of Mother Nature. On December 20, 2022, the quaint town of Rio Dell, in Humboldt County was at the epicenter of a 6.4 magnitude earthquake that killed two people, injured more than a dozen others, damaged homes and left thousands without power. Just as the town began to rebuild and recover, another 5.4 magnitude earthquake hit nine miles southeast of Rio Dell on New Year's Day, rattling the already impacted area in Humboldt County.

When a large-scale natural disaster hits a community in California, the California Fire Foundation steps up and offers help to those impacted. Whether a community experiences an earthquake, wildfire, a global pandemic, flood, mudslide, or other disaster, the wide variety of the Foundation's programs support the critical needs of those touched by disaster.

In the aftermath of the Rio Dell earthquake, the California Fire Foundation, in partnership with Humboldt Community Organizations Active in Disaster (COAD), distributed over \$87,000 in disaster relief to survivors in the affected community, whose homes were





The sad reality of the profession is that every year, we lose more of our bravest and most dedicated individuals in the line of duty. The Memorial Wall now carries more than 1,500 names - nearly twice the number when it was unveiled just two decades ago.

Our ability to provide this essential tribute depends on expanding the California Firefighters Memorial. The California Fire Foundation is implementing a plan to expand the current memorial so that all those we lose in the line of duty will be honored and have a place on the wall forever.

The Memorial was built, and is maintained, entirely through private donations — much of it coming from firefighters themselves. We welcome contributions large and small to ensure we can continue to pay tribute to our brave fallen brothers and sisters for generations to come.

This year's ceremony will take place on October 14, 2023.

CALIFORNIA'S WILDFIRE sea-

son is almost a year-round event, but here at the Foundation, we are fortunate to be able to offer much-needed help during these traumatic disasters.

Last year, the state once again battled some major, deadly wildfire disasters, including the Oak, McKinney, Mosquito and Fork Fires. Through our Disaster Relief programs, the California Fire Foundation activated thousands of its Disaster Relief cash cards and distributed over \$650,000 in direct aid to survivors of these fires.


The harsh reality of disasters is that individuals often evacuate their homes with nothing more than the clothes they are wearing. Under-resourced communities and economically disadvantaged populations and vulnerable populations, including the uninsured and under-insured, the elderly, and the disabled, often experience greater barriers to resources and, therefore, worse outcomes when disasters strike. The \$250 cash cards distributed at Local Assistance Centers and Discovery Recovery Centers by our CBO partners, offer assistance

during the immeasurable hardship and provide immediate relief so survivors may purchase basic necessities such as medicine, food, gas, lodging, or clothing.

"When we see people walk through our assistance center doors, they are traumatized and overwhelmed. The Disaster Relief cards from the California Fire Foundation offer them immediate hope and comfort in these darkest of times, and for that, we are so grateful." 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


FLOUR DUST PIZZA PAYING IT FORWARD.

ON APRIL 25, 2021, Caylie Valenta's life as she knew it changed forever when her husband, a firefighter with Vista Fire Department, passed away after a brave 3-month battle with melanoma. Andy Valenta, a loving husband, and father to two young daughters, was just 33 years old.

A year after his passing, Caylie and fellow Vista firefighter, Mark Gaffney, founded the Andy Valenta Melanoma Foundation with the goal of preventing other families from going through the heartbreak of losing a loved one to melanoma.

Rick Martinez, Executive Director of the California Fire Foundation, recently met with Caylie to present her with a donation to assist her in her work raising awareness of the heightened occupational risk of melanoma for firefighters and providing annual skin checks to as many fire departments as possible.

"Thanks to this generous donation from the California Fire Foundation, we can remain focused on our mission to help find melanoma before it spreads and hopefully save the lives of the men and women who already risk their lives to help us and prevent families from experiencing the nightmare that my family endured. This money will allow us to provide skin cancer screenings for more departments and continue to raise awareness about cancer in the fire service," said Caylie.

The need to address fire prevention and preparedness is an integral part of living in California. In 2022, we awarded over \$1.95 million in statewide grants to 116 California fire departments, associations, and nonprofit organizations. Funding directly supports local fire prevention planning, specialized firefighting and personal protective equipment, fuels reduction and defensible space efforts, community safety initiatives, and disaster relief and recovery projects.

Applications are now open through March 24 for California Fire Foundation Wildfire Preparedness & Wildfire Prevention grants in partnership with Edison International.

Wildfire Preparedness & Wildfire Prevention funding of up to \$15,000 is open to California fire departments, firefighter associations, and nonprofit community-based organizations in Edison International's Southern, Central, and Coastal service areas.

PIPES & DRUMS OF CALIFORNIA PROFESSIONAL FIREFIGHTERS




